organization LinuxChix Africa. She also serves as a director at Ushahidi, and she is a member of the council of the Free Software and Open Source Foundation for Africa. Through her day to day work as an entrepreneur and computer scientist, she seeks to see technology positively transforming the lives of the African society, governments and enterprises. In 2012 Dorcas was inducted by the Internet Society into the Internet Hall of Fame.
